From the Principal

Welcome to Week 9 Term 3.

Welcome to the final newsletter for term 3. Reading continues to be our focus across all grades at Kotara South PS. This term I have run a series of articles in all newsletters explaining different aspects of reading. These holidays can I strongly encourage all families to continue time reading with your child. Even a few minutes a day makes a difference to a child's learning and keeps those reading aloud skills sharpened. Visit the local library and borrow some books. Take your book on a picnic and soak up the sun. Doing some spring cleaning over the break and



perhaps making a reading nook in the bedroom or lounge room could be an easy way for your child to keep engaged in reading. Don't forget to model reading by reading aloud to your child and showing them that you are a reader yourself.

We have now really got into the rhythm of 'doing school' in COVID times. For us at KSPS this means we have the benefit of a huge playground for children to run, play learn and have fun with friends. Teachers also utilise this space to get outside and learn. For us COVID has been about taking the circumstances we have and adapting to the restrictions. We have always had a lens of innovation over what we do to ensure that we can still engage fully in the business of learning and teaching. There have been several things that have changed for us due to these restrictions. There are two specific events that we are working on in the background knowing that COVID has thus far prevented them going ahead: 1. Kindergarten orientation and 2. Stage 2 and 3 camps. At this moment in time it is very unlikely that we will be able to run the stage 2 and 3 camps in term 4. Not only are we awaiting on the go ahead from the Dept of Education, but also there needs to be the easing of restrictions for venues etc. We are making alternative plans for students back at school, for example, year 6 will have some special events for their last year of primary school. The children are handling this information very well with a common sense approach and coming to terms with the differences.

In regards to Kinder Orientation for 2021, we have been busily working to bring the information to parents. In recent weeks, we have shared with our enrolled Kinder 2021 parents a video presentation with all the Kinder enrolment information you will need. Miss Partridge has also shared the Interview of our Kinder 'reporters' sharing information about Kindergarten from this year's Kinder students. At the start of next term, we will have weekly reminders for the parent information. In regards to running Kinder Orientation session inside the school and what this may look like. Of course all of this depends on the new round of restrictions from DoE after the term break. With the current guidelines on Kindergarten for 2021. This will include a mix of online forums for parents and some different approaches to bringing children on site in term 4. Please know we are just as troubled as you when we think about our Kinders and the fun and learning we want them to be having when transitioning to big school Stay connected with our KSPS Facebook, and the Skoolbag 2021 Kinder group for further information. If you know of a new or existing family in our school zone who have a Kinder aged child ready for school in 2021, please encourage them to enrol ASAP.

At present, every school in NSW is undergoing the new school planning process, starting with a situational analysis. The situational analysis is a key component of the School Excellence cycle and is an essential step in the development of a Strategic Improvement Plan (SIP) that will effectively prioritise our school's identified areas for growth. Conducting a situational analysis allows our school to develop a rich and highly contextualised understanding of our current situation. As part of this situational analysis, every school collects qualitative and quantitative data, collates evidence,





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collaborates widely, and engages with research. At the P&C meeting in November, I will be presenting our work to engage with our school community.



Attendance: last fortnight we released our Spring in to School initiative to keep school attendance on everyone's radar. Even though we are all working to ensure we keep everyone safe with COIVD symptoms, our attendance data actually is one of the strongest in the Glenrock network (over 3000 students). What a WOW for KSPS! A very big thank you to all parents and carers for your common sense approach, keeping children at home if they are not well, getting COVID tested, sharing the negative result with school and returning when they are better. Thanks again everyone.

COUNSELLOR CORNER

Managing emotions

Primary school children are still learning to identify emotions, understand why they happen, and how to manage them. As children develop the things that provoke emotional responses change, as do the strategies they use to deal with them.

Some children show a high level of emotional maturity while quite young, whereas others take longer to develop the skills to manage their emotions. This is really normal – everyone develops at different stages and paces.

All children need support from their parents and caregivers to understand their feelings, as well as encouragement to work out ways to manage them – some might just need a bit of extra help to figure things out.

Understanding your child's feelings

Supporting children's emotional development starts with paying attention to their feelings and noticing how they manage them. By acknowledging children's emotional responses and providing guidance, you can help children understand and accept feelings, and develop effective strategies for managing them

The Learning and Support Process at KSPS

The Learning and Support Team (LST) at KSPS are dedicated to supporting the implementation, monitoring and reviewing of personalised learning adjustments to support students with a range of learning/ social/ emotional and physical needs and challenges. There are a myriad of ways we do this but key to our success is the communication between staff, parents/carers and medical practitioners. All relevant information from parents/carers and reports from Occupational Therapists, Speech Pathologists and Psychologists are submitted to the LST to ensure the recommendations are available to inform current and future class teachers in supporting students. When emailing reports/ recommendations to the school please always ensure you add 'attention class teacher/ LST' in the subject line.

THE MECHANICS OF READING IN THE EARLY YEARS

Learning to read is a complex skill.

Oral language is the foundation for learning to read. Children who are surrounded by rich and increasingly complex conversations have an advantage in vocabulary development, language structures and tuning in to the sounds of the English language.

In the early years, children learn how print relates to the speech they already know. They learn that letters **represent** sounds (phonemes) and they are taught to say all phonemes clearly and precisely.

Phonemic Awareness is the ability to hear and manipulate the sounds in spoken words and understand that spoken words and syllables are made up of sequences of speech sounds. It is auditory and does not involve words in print. Phonemic awareness is fundamental to mapping speech to print. If a child cannot hear that "dog" and "dirt" begin with the same sound or cannot blend the sounds /sssssuuuuuunnnnn/ into the word "sun", he or she may have great difficulty connecting sounds with their written symbols or blending sounds to make a word. Without phonemic awareness, phonics makes little sense.

Phonics is the ability to associate sounds with written letters and use these sounds to read words. Children are taught to identify the sounds that different combinations of letters make – such as 'ch' or 'oa' and blend sounds together from left to right to make a word.

Phonics and phonemic awareness are the keys to successful decoding.

Decoding involves taking apart the sounds in words (*segmenting*) and blending sounds together. It requires both knowledge of letter-sound relationships, as well as an ability to apply that knowledge to successfully identify written words and make meaning. Decoding is essential to reading. It allows children to work out most words they have heard but may not have seen in print, as well as sound out words they are not familiar with. The ability to decode is the foundation upon which all other reading instruction—fluency, vocabulary and reading comprehension are built.

How You Can Help Your Child Decode

- Look through the whole word from left to right.
- Use your finger to segment the words into sounds, syllables or chunks
- Blend the sounds
- Listen to your own voice and think... Does that word make sense?
- Ask for help if you are unsure

Try to make time to read with your child every day. Grandparents and older brothers or sisters can help, too.

All orders are filled on Tuesday mornings – if you would like to receive your order that day, we need to receive it prior to 8.30am. Please write your child's name and class in the "Notes to Seller" during the checkout process so we can send your order home with your child. If you have any issues with incorrect sizing, please return the items to the uniform shop via the school office, with a note saying who they are from, and what size you'd like to receive in exchange. We process exchanges at the same time each week as new orders.

If you are interested in purchasing second-hand items, please send an email to <u>kspsuniforms@gmail.com</u> with details of what you want, including sizes, and our uniform shop coordinator will check if we have any suitable items for you. We will send them home via your child's class so please include your child's name and class in the email. We will then email you an invoice for the items purchased that can be paid online. All second-hand items are \$5 each (plus a small card processing fee). If you have second-hand items to donate that are in good condition, these can also be sent in via the school office.

QKR!

You can download the canteen's Qkr! ordering app for your phone or tablet from the Apple or Android stores, or you can access the ordering system via any webpage at this link: <u>https://qkr-store.qkrschool.com/store/#/home</u>. Once you've set up your account and profiles for your child/ren (<u>instructions here</u>), it's easy to order from our canteen menu up to two weeks in advance. The main thing to remember is that **orders close at 8.50am each day** – so please be sure to place your order prior to the cut-off time. **Please take care to order your child's lunch for the correct day and date**.

We welcome use of your reusable lunch order bags – just send them in with a note stating "online order" and we'll match your child's bag with their order (be sure to label the lunch bag with their name and class). Lunch order bags are available for purchase via Qkr or over the counter at the canteen, for \$10 each.
